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1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 Overview of trapca's mandate

The Trade Policy Training Centre in Africa (**trapca**) was inaugurated in December 2006, with the mandate of providing training and technical expertise on trade issues to professionals in Least Developed Countries (LDCs) and low income Sub-Saharan African countries. Situated in Arusha, Tanzania, the Centre operates under the auspices of the Eastern and Southern Africa Management Institute (ESAMI) and Lund University in Sweden.

The overall aim of the training activities of **trapca** is to bring new perspectives to world trade, to inspire the creation of networks in LDCs and low income Sub-Saharan African countries and to develop competencies for strengthening the capacity of these countries to engage within the international trading systems with a view of overcoming the constraints to utilise the development-related opportunities provided by trade. The training activities of **trapca** are premised on the belief that LDCs and low income Sub-Saharan African countries are not able to reap the benefits of globalisation and international trade due to inadequate capacity and knowledge in trade issues.

In fulfilment of its mandate, **trapca** is running four programmes:

- An intensive 4-week entry-level foundation course (TRP 100) leading to an award of a Certificate in International Trade and Development (CITD).
- Executive Short Courses, (TRP200 series). This level is designed as short duration dialogue type courses targeting the senior participants on demand. The course menu under the 200 series focuses on topical trade policy issues that incorporate ongoing negotiations, debates and policy dialogues in the region and at the global arena. The course delivery approaches emphasis student-led and workshop-inclined processes.
- Specialised short courses (TRP 300 series) each lasting for two weeks. Successful completion of each course leads to an award of a Certificate of Competence in a particular area of trade policy or trade law.
- A Master Programme in International Trade Policy and Trade Law (TRP 500 series). Successful completion of each course leads to an award of a Certificate of Competence in a particular area of trade policy or trade law. After successful completion of 10 courses and a thesis corresponding to two modules the student is awarded a Master of Science Degree in International Trade Policy and Trade Law issued by Lund University.

The relevance of the above programmes resides in their ability to promote the kinds of knowledge and understanding as well as key competencies and capacities that make it possible for participants to help their countries to:

- Make full use of existing opportunities in foreign markets.
- Choose import, industrial, investment and trade facilitation policies conducive to development and poverty reduction, given existing trade agreements.
- Influence future agreements in an advantageous manner by negotiating improvements for LDCs and low income Sub-Saharan African countries in access to foreign markets while maintaining abilities to pursue trade and trade influencing policies conducive to development and poverty reduction.



1.2 trapca's Strategic Thrust

trapca programmes are based on the trade capacity needs within LDCs and other low income Sub-Saharan African countries. The centre will continue to ensure that programmes benefit from periodic research carried out in the form of training needs assessment and participants' feedback. Programme appraisal, tracer studies and impact assessment form important parts of **trapca's** training and capacity building process.

The training programmes presented in this prospectus will endeavour to create a strong bridge between theory and practice. In this connection, the instructional methods for these programmes will aim at providing learners with work-related skills and high retention rates of the knowledge imparted. The pedagogy will incorporate multi-modal

delivery mechanisms for course materials (e.g. case studies, in-field situational tasks, simulation and role playing, trade data retrieval exercises, and presentation of course exercises and tasks).

Tailor made programmes and courses will be designed to address clients' specific training needs. These will be conducted on mutual arrangement at venues and dates convenient to the client.

1.3 trapca's Capability and Comparative Advantages

As a highly specialised trade policy and trade law training institution, **trapca** aims at being a converging centre where trade personnel from LDCs and low income countries meet and share experiences on how to engage in the context of the multilateral, regional and bilateral trading systems. As the premier African based, LDC-focused trade policy and law training institution in Africa, **trapca's** capability is engrained in the following characteristics:

- A network of institutional and individual contacts collated through the long history of the collaborating institutions – ESAMI and Lund University – and through **trapca's** own credibility.
- A successful trade policy training institution based in Africa, managed by a competent team committed to effective improvement and innovation.
- A highly motivated, eminent global faculty of leading scholars in trade policy and trade law.
- A sustainable financial base.

1.4 The Collaborating Institutions

trapca operates under the auspices of the Eastern and Southern African Management Institute (ESAMI) and Lund University, with the financial support of the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida).

ESAMI is the host institution of **trapca** and has the overall responsibility for the **trapca** training activities. ESAMI provides logistical and practical support to **trapca** and acts as its legal representative when required.

The Department of Economics, Lund University, is the academic partner to ESAMI and **trapca**. Lund University provides academic support in the planning of curricula

and is responsible for the implementation, quality control, and examination of the Master Programme.

In addition, the **trapca** network involves relevant trade institutions such as WTO, CUTS International, the South-North Network and the World Trade Institute.



1.5 How to Apply

Prospective trainees should apply using forms available from **trapca's** website www.trapca.org, **trapca** offices at the ESAMI Headquarters in Arusha, Tanzania or from ESAMI Country offices, currently present in Dar es Salaam (Tanzania), Harare (Zimbabwe), Kampala (Uganda), Lilongwe (Malawi), Lusaka (Zambia), Nairobi (Kenya), Maputo (Mozambique), Mbabane (Swaziland) and Windhoek (Namibia). The contact details of **trapca**, ESAMI Headquarters and Country Offices are given at the end of this Prospectus.

1.6 Fees and Financing

Financially support from the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida) allows participants to apply for partial or full scholarship. Priority will be given to students from LDCs and with the objective to obtain gender balance, The tuition fee for self-financed participants is specified below for the various courses and programmes.

2. FOUNDATION COURSE - CERTIFICATE IN INTERNATIONAL TRADE AND DEVELOPMENT

2.1 Venue

2.3 Overview

The foundation course gives an introduction to trade theory, trade law and development. Moreover, participants are required to undergo an intensive practically oriented module on international negotiation and cooperation combining theoretical study and moot negotiations. The foundation course enhances some elementary research and presentation skills as participants submit a short analytical paper. The course serves as a background to the topics covered in the specialised short courses offered by **trapca**.

The duration of the course is four weeks. During this period the course is delivered through intensive on site training at **trapca**/ESAMI campus. The language of instruction is English.



2.4 Objectives

The objectives of the foundation course are to promote knowledge and understanding as well as key competencies for:

- Understanding the basics of the theory of international trade.
- Analysing the role of international trade in regional and national development.
- Deepening the understanding of the global regulatory framework for international trade, including the current issues of trade regulation that are pertinent to developing countries.
- Understanding the current issues of discussion in multilateral trade negotiations, and the stakes, constraints and opportunities for the developing world in those negotiations.
- Understanding the basics of trade data retrieval and analysis.
- Developing basic trade diplomacy and leadership skills.
- Developing quality research and writing skills necessary for preparing trade-related briefs or position papers.

2.5 Target Group

The target audience of the foundation course consists of those who are involved in trade-related activities in their capacity as officials, executives or members of relevant ministries and government agencies, parliamentary institutions, universities, business and civil society organisations in LDCs and other low income Sub-Saharan African countries.

2.6 Content

The foundation course leading to Certificate in International Trade and Development entails six study modules, each lasting 1-5 days of training. These are:

- Module 1: Trade and Development
- Module 2: Introduction to International Trade Law
- Module 3: Trade Data Retrieval and Analysis
- Module 4: Leadership Development for Trade
- Module 5: Introduction to Trade Negotiations and Cooperation
- Module 6: Analytical Paper

The modules are evaluated by exercises in Trade Data Retrieval and Analysis, two written examinations and the submission of an analytical paper. Participants who successfully complete the assessments will be awarded a Certificate of Competence in International Trade and Development. Other participants will be awarded a Certificate of Attendance in International Trade and Development

2.7 Entry Requirements

The general admission requirements for the CITD are:

- Participants should have a first degree in economics, law, social science or another relevant field or its equivalent.
- Participants should have work experience from a trade or development related area in government, the wider public sector, private sector or non-governmental/civil society organisation.
- Participants should originate from LDCs or low income Sub-Saharan African countries. Participants from other countries could be admitted when seats are available.
- Participants should have a good command of the English language. Where English was not the medium of instruction during the applicant's first degree or its equivalent, there must be evidence of good knowledge of English demonstrated through appropriate passes in TOEFL or other internationally recognised English language proficiency qualifications.

2.8 Awards

Upon completion of all the modules, a participant is awarded a post graduate certificate in international trade development

3. TAILOR-MADE COURSES

trapca can offer several different tailor-made courses according to demand. This includes commissioned education and jointly offered courses in collaboration with other institutions.

4. SPECIALISED SHORT COURSES

4.1 Overview

The Specialised Short Courses aim at providing awareness in a particular topic on trade policy and trade law. The courses are intended to create very precise competencies, and successful trainees are awarded a certificate of competence in the specific area of focus.

The delivery of the courses is intensive on-site learning activities of two weeks in residence at **trapca**/ESAMI campus preceded by preparatory readings and related a pre-session assignment.

4.2 Target group

The target audience of **trapca**'s proposed short courses consists of those who are involved in trade-related activities in their capacity as officials, executives or members of relevant ministries and government agencies, parliamentary institutions, universities, business and civil society organizations.



4.3 Entry requirements

The general admission requirements for the Specialised Short Course are as follows:

- Participants should have a first academic degree in economics, law, social science or another relevant field or its equivalent.
- Participants should have work experience from a trade or development related area in government, the wider public sector, private sector or non-governmental/civil society organisation.
- Participants should originate from LDCs or low income Sub-Saharan African countries.
- Participants should have a good command of the English language. Where English was not the medium of instruction language during the applicant's first degree, there must be evidence of good knowledge of English demonstrated through appropriate passes in TOEFL or other internationally recognised English language proficiency qualifications.
- Participants who have successfully completed a foundation course covering the issues of Trade and/or Development, such as the **trapca**'s foundational course TRP 100 Certificate in International Trade and Development (CITD) or its equivalent are given priority over other applicants with similar qualifications in all other respects.

4.5 Courses

Currently, the following thirteen specialised short courses exist:

The courses described in detail below will be offered in 2012.

TRP 301: International Trade Policy and Development

This course is primarily concerned with building capacity to evaluate the development and poverty effects of trade and trade facilitation with special emphasis on policies related to exports, imports, industry, and investment. The participant gains an understanding of the possible impact of trade, industry and investment policies on development and poverty. Such an understanding will rest on an appreciation of the theoretical foundations of international trade introduced in the course.

TRP 302: International Trade Law and Development

This course analyses the historical evolution of the regulatory framework of world trading. It covers the rules on merchandise trade in the GATT and compares that regime with the prevailing WTO framework. It deals with the principles of international trade in goods, trade in services, intellectual property and trade-related investments measures across bilateral, regional and multilateral trade arrangements.

TRP 303: Quantitative Trade Policy Analysis

This course is geared at improving the awareness and understanding of quantitative methods, which in turn can contribute to evaluations of development and poverty effects of negotiation positions and outcomes as well as domestic trade-related policy choices. The course is primarily designed for those who have some prior exposure to economic statistics and quantitative economic analysis and have, or expect to have, specialist positions as trade policy analysts. It introduces common analytical methods and tools widely used for the purpose of quantifying likely effects of alternative trade agreement outcomes and trade policy options.

TRP 304: Trade Negotiations and Cooperation

This course is devoted to the specific knowledge of negotiation procedures and strategies needed to effectively negotiate improvements in the access to foreign markets while maintaining an ability to pursue policies considered to be of relevance to development and poverty reduction objectives. The objective of the course is to familiarize the participants with both bilateral and multilateral trade negotiations. In this context, the importance of cooperation is underlined - a negotiation seldom has one winner and one loser. In order to arrive at a result that all sides can accept it is necessary to compromise, i.e. to cooperate. All participants are expected to take an active part in actual negotiating simulations. They will also have to construct a scenario of their own and use wit and imagination in order to try to come to terms.



TRP 309: Agricultural Trade and Export Development

Agricultural trade is undoubtedly the single most important link between trade and poverty in LDCs given its dominance in the exports of these countries and the livelihoods of the majority of their citizens who constitute the vast majority of the poor. In that context, it points out the key issues that are of special interest to African decision-makers and discusses the strategic agricultural trade and export development issues associated with poverty reduction which are increasingly gaining interest in the region. The main purpose is to strengthen the capacity of African trainers and analysts, to help policy makers: understand the implications of recent trends and developments in agricultural trade flows, recent global market developments and how they can contribute to economic growth and poverty reduction; understand and effectively participate in international (bilateral, regional, or multilateral) agricultural trade negotiations; and; design and formulate efficient unilateral domestic trade policies in the face of the challenges and opportunities presented by the developments in the international food and agricultural markets.

TRP 314: Green Economy and Trade

The global economic crisis of 2008 has brought a new impetus that demands a true harmonisation of economic, social and environmental aspects in sustainable development. This has witnessed concerted efforts to address, especially climate change, biodiversity loss and jobs creation. To this end, new generation trade agreements need to mainstream environmental considerations as the world moves into a low carbon and green economy model. The green economy development model has gained acceptance from the political front and key stakeholders now look forward to a world that emits less greenhouse gases as well as conserve its biodiversity and ecosystems. At the core of the green global economy is the need to mitigate and adapt to climate change through technology transfer, environmental financing and capacity building. As global leaders continue to adjust to global warming, stricter climate regulatory regimes that impact severely on trade have emerged and countries from the South like those in Africa will be most affected.

5. POST-GRADUATE DIPLOMA IN INTERNATIONAL TRADE POLICY AND TRADE LAW, INTERMEDIARY LEVEL

5.1 Venue

5.2 Overview

The Post-Graduate Diploma programme in International Trade Policy and Trade Law, Intermediary Level consists of a specified number of **trapca's** specialised short courses and will together with a one module research paper qualify the student for achieving a **trapca** Diploma in international trade policy and trade law.

The Post-Graduate Diploma in International Trade Policy and Trade Law, Intermediary Level is designed to promote knowledge and create competencies that give effect to **trapca's** mandate. The target audience of this Diploma consists of those who are involved in trade-related activities in their capacity as officials, executives or members of relevant ministries and government agencies, parliamentary institutions, universities, business and civil society organisations in LDCs and other low income Sub-Saharan African countries.

5.4 Contents

The Post-Graduate Diploma in International Trade Policy and Trade Law, Intermediary Level consists of three core courses, three elective courses and a research paper according to the following:

1) Three core courses:

- TRP 301: International Trade Policy and Development
- TRP 302: International Trade Law and Development
- TRP 303: Quantitative Trade Policy Analysis

2) (a) Three elective courses, chosen from the following:

- TRP 304: International Negotiations and Cooperation for Trade
- TRP 305: Trade Remedies and Dispute Settlement
- TRP 306: Trade, Environment, Human Rights and Labour
- TRP 307: Trade, Intellectual Property and Competition Policy
- TRP 308: Investment and Trade Facilitation
- TRP 309: Trade in Agriculture
- TRP 310: Trade in Services
- TRP 311: Trade Policy, Gender and Poverty Alleviation
- TRP 312: South-South Regional Integration
- TRP 313: Strategic Management for Trade
- TRP 314: Green Economy and Trade

OR

(b) Two elective specialised courses and a competence in the foundation course, TRP 100: CITD

3) A research paper (equivalent to one module):

- TRP 400: Research Paper



5.5 Entry Requirements

After completing the three core courses and three electives the student can apply to do a diploma research paper and qualify for a Post-Graduate Diploma in International Trade Policy and Trade Law, Intermediary Level. To qualify for the research paper module the applicant must (1) have successfully completed (i.e. have been awarded Certificates of Competence) in a total of six required Diploma courses as listed above under point 1 and either 2(a) or 2(b), and (2) have submitted a high-quality and relevant research paper proposal.

The six study modules can be obtained in any order. However, the research paper concludes the Diploma. As a rule, each module is examined through a pre-session assignment, class participation, analytical paper and a final written examination.

Since the Diploma is acquired through registering for the specialised short courses, the entry requirements of these courses apply i.e.

- Participants should have a first academic degree in economics, law, social science or another relevant field or its equivalent.
- Participants should have work experience from a trade or development related area in government, the wider public sector, private sector or non-governmental/ civil society organisation.
- Participants should originate from LDCs or low income Sub-Saharan African countries.
- Participants should have a good command of the English language. Where English was not the medium of instruction language during the applicant's first degree, there must be evidence of good knowledge of English demonstrated through appropriate passes in TOEFL or other internationally recognised English language proficiency qualifications.
- Participants who have successfully completed a foundation course covering the issues of Trade and/or Development, such as the **trapca's** foundational course TRP 100 Certificate in International Trade and Development (CITD) or its equivalent are given priority over other applicants with similar qualifications in all other respects.

6. THE MASTER OF SCIENCE PROGRAMME AND THE POST-GRADUATE DIPLOMA, ADVANCED LEVEL, IN INTERNATIONAL TRADE POLICY AND TRADE LAW

6.3 Overview

The Master Programme takes on a development perspective to international trade issues and offers training with a strong applied perspective. By combining economic aspects of international trade with the legal framework, the programme takes a multifaceted approach to international trade issues. The combination of international law and economics allow participants to pursue in depth studies of international trade regulation and trade policy.

Existing programmes around the world take either a global or regional perspective in international trade law and policy. By focusing on the LDCs and low-income developing countries, this programme is neither global nor regional in focus but transcends into LDCs as an economic category of states, thereby addressing unmet training needs. With the unique combination of economics, international law, and development, this programme is ideal to prepare participants for utilising the development-related opportunities provided by trade and to bring new perspectives to world trade.

The programme creates a strong bridge between theory and practice by combining vocational and academic training. It builds on the participants' previous experience from the field, both in practical work and in terms of relevant academic background. In view of the fact that most of the available training opportunities are limited to academic training; a strong case exists for practical training. By combining important fundamental knowledge in economics and law with trade issues of current interest, the programme offers a thorough and up to date education. The programme involves key training from a global faculty of specialists in economics, international law, and political science.

The Master of Science Degree in International Trade Policy and Trade Law can be achieved by taking individual advanced level specialized courses. **trapca's** Masters program consist of 10 advanced level specialized courses and one master thesis. In total the master program consists of 90 ECTS units of which 75 ECTS are taken in form of literature course work and a thesis amounting to 15 ECTS.

The Independent Advanced Level Courses are open to students not enrolled into the regular MSc programme. This arrangement provides the needed flexibility to those who may, due to a variety of good reasons, find it difficult to consecutively pursue the MSc modules as presented during **trapca's** normal academic calendar (see also the description of the Post-Graduate Diploma in International Trade Policy and Trade Law, Advanced Level, below).



6.4 Objectives

The programme aims at giving students:

- A highly developed global mindset with a grasp of international trade regulation and policy issues with a focus on LDCs.
- Ability to think critically, strategically and independently.
- Enhanced understanding of the linkages between international trade law, trade policy and development.
- Enhanced understanding of bilateral, regional, and multilateral international trade negotiations, agreement institutions and related processes.
- Enhanced quest for practical innovation and creativity in trade policy design, administration and management.
- Ability to manage diversity in various domestic and international trade institutions.
- Ability to early recognise trends in international trade work and to effectively engage in its development.

6.5 Target Group

This programme and the Independent Advanced Level Courses target graduate students in economics, law, social sciences or other relevant fields, who are working in a trade or development related area in government, the wider public sector, private sector or non-governmental/civil society organisation in LDCs or other low income Sub-Saharan African countries. The programme and the Independent Advanced Level Courses are designed for students who are interested in gaining advanced theoretical and practical knowledge and skills in the specialised area of international trade regulation and policy.

6.6 Entry Requirements

The admission requirements to the **trapca**'s advanced level courses are an academic first degree in economics, law, social science or another relevant field or the equivalent knowledge, and have work experience in trade related fields.

Furthermore, to be qualified for the advanced courses, applicants must have passed **trapca**'s intermediate specialised courses **TRP 301, TRP 302 and TRP 303** or have equivalent qualifications.

Applicants that do not have an academic first degree but an advanced diploma from a university or academic learning institution can be considered for admission to the advanced level specialised courses provided that the applicant has a Post-Graduate Diploma in International Trade Policy and Trade Law, Intermediate Level.

Post-Graduate Diploma in International Trade Policy and Trade Law, Advanced Level

To qualify for any Independent Advanced Level Course, a candidate shall satisfy the requirements for admission into the Master of Science in International Trade Policy and Trade Law Programme, as set out herein.

Structure

Each Independent Advanced Level Course is essentially a level 500 (MSc) module in terms of content and what is required to pass the module, the only difference is that the Course is offered separately, and individually.

The list of all level 500 courses available in the form of Independent Advanced Level Course is published at the beginning of each year in the **trapca** Prospectus available at **trapca**'s website.

The Independent Advanced Level Courses may lead to either a Postgraduate Diploma in International Trade Policy and Trade Law, Advanced Level; or to a Master of Science Degree in International Trade Policy and Trade Law.

To qualify for the award of the Postgraduate Diploma in International Trade Policy and Trade Law, Advanced Level; a candidate shall be required to complete and pass the following Independent Advanced Level Courses:

- TRP 501 (Economic Foundations of Trade and Trade Policy);
- TRP 502 (Legal Foundations of Trade and Trade Policy); and
- Any other three Courses, from the following: TRP 503 (Tools for Trade Policy Analysis), TRP 504 (Sectoral Trade Policy Analysis and Development), TRP 505 (Trade and Commercial Policies), TRP 506 (Topics in Trade Policy I), TRP 507 (Regional, Bilateral and Multilateral Trade Policies), TRP 508 (Trade Negotiation, Cooperation and Leadership), TRP 509 (Topics in Trade Policy II), and TRP 510 (Topics in Trade Policy III).

To continue the studies up to the MSc – degree in International Trade Policy and Trade Law the candidate can apply for admission to the MSc-track.

Application to the MSc-track

There will be two submission dates for application to the MSc-track per year, one during the spring semester and one during the autumn semester. Please visit **trapca**'s website (www.trapca.org) for information about submission dates. Applications that are reaching the **trapca** office in Arusha will be considered for admission by the next admission process.

Admission Criteria

The admission will be based on the same criteria as are normal for admission to the **trapca** programs with the main criteria being the academic performance during the previous post-graduate advanced level studies at **trapca**. The post-graduate diploma must not be more than 5 years old.

Minimum requirement

The candidate must have completed and passed at least 5 advanced level courses, including TRP 501 and 502, from the advanced level program and normally achieved at least an average mark of 60% on 5 advanced level courses. Students that have an average of at least 60% on the 5 best courses will be directly qualified for admission as long as the number of students falls below the available number of seats in the

track. If not all of these direct qualified applicants can be admitted the most qualified will be selected. If the number of qualified falls below the number of available seats in the MSc-track an individual evaluation of each applicant will be made and only those who can be expected to successfully complete the MSc-degree will be selected. Others will be given special advises on how to become qualified for admission later on.

Total number of admissions

The maximum number of applicants that annually planned to be admitted to the MSc-track is 30. The distribution of these seats between the spring and autumn will be based on the decided academic calendar.

Supervision

To be allocated a supervisor, as a rule, the MSc-candidate should successfully have completed 6 advanced courses including TRP 503. Before applying for a supervisor, the candidate is strongly recommended to think of and formulate a suitable thesis subject and also plan for the thesis work by carefully reading the booklet "The Art of Writing and Speaking" published by the Department of Political Science at Lund University:

or a similar publication about scientific authoring.

A candidate who after meeting the above requirements is admitted into the Msc in International Trade Policy and Trade Law programme shall qualify to be allocated a supervisor, and may write the thesis as he/she enrolls for the last four Independent Advanced Level Courses, to make a total of ten Courses plus the thesis to qualify for the Msc degree in International Trade Policy and Trade Law.

Since the Independent Advanced Level Courses are offered through a two-week, intensive on-site learning, appropriate pre-session and post session learning activities will in each case be designed by faculty with the approval of the Academic Director to ensure that the usual weight of 7.5 ECTS credits required for the MSc. Modules is attained in respect of the Independent Advanced Level Courses as well.

6.7 Accreditation

The Master Programme is accredited by Lund University, Sweden. The degree will be offered by Lund University.

6.8 Structure

The Master Programme and the Independent Advanced Level Courses combine the on-site learning activities with off-site activities. Intensive on-site training is preceded by preparatory reading and related exercises for submission. There is also post-session follow up work, involving, for instance, problem solving and paper writing that may include parts that are customised to individual workplace needs. Hence, the participants are involved in study activities before as well as after the on-site sessions. However, the off-site activities might well be combined with working.

6.9 Contents

The Master programme entails ten modules plus a Master's thesis which is equivalent to two modules, amounting to a total of twelve modules. To qualify for the award of the Master of Science in International Trade Policy and Law, students must pass the following Advanced Level modules, including the Master's thesis:

TRP 501: Economic Foundations of Trade and Trade Policy

The economic theory and evidence of trade and trade policy, Roles of trade and trade policy in economic development.

TRP 502: Legal Foundations of Trade and Trade Policy

The origins, institutional structure and decision-making process of the GATT/WTO treaty regimes; Sources of Trade Law and relationship between trade agreements and the GATT/WTO legal system.

TRP 503: Tools for Trade Policy Analysis

The measurement of trade policy instruments; Modeling the effects of trade policy, partial and general equilibrium approaches and econometric modelling, Data retrieval, analysis and presentation; the research process and report writing.

TRP 504: Sectoral Trade Policies and Development

International trade and policy distortions in key economic sectors of developing countries

TRP 505: Trade and Commercial Policies

The political economy of trade policy; Theory and evidence related to domestic and transnational lobby group formation and influence over trade policy; Instruments of trade policy: Trade policies and poverty alleviation – channels of influence of trade and trade policies on poverty; Scope of pro-poor trade policies.

TRP 506: Topics in Trade Policy I

This module will provide an in-depth analysis of a selection of current topical issues in trade policy or provide depth to items that have been introduced in other modules. The range of topics will vary with changing policy conditions and problems, but the following is an illustrative list of possible topics (of which typically one or two may constitute the module):

TRP 511: Master's Thesis (equivalent to 2 modules)

The selection of a thesis topic allows students to specialise in areas of particular interest and relevance to professional demands in their workplace. The thesis will consist of approximately 20 000 words.
